

### **End of Year Report** 2022-2023

#### Dear partners, donors, and friends,

Each year Nevet continues to work for Israel's children, pursing our goal to reach every school where there are children lacking food security and are in need of the assistance we provide. It is with great pride that I share with you some highlights of our activities during the academic year 2022-2023.

Each school day Nevet supplied some 12,000 nutritious sandwiches to school children across the country. Furthermore, thanks to your help, we were also able to expand into five new municipalities: Safed, Netivot, Beer Sheva, Kfar Saba and Mitzpe Ramon.

Nevet, however, is not just about sandwiches, and we have been active on a number of fronts in order to ensure that no child in Israel goes hungry. It is gratifying to note that the Ministry of Welfare, having published a new criteria test, has certified Nevet as a program provider, and we have thus been granted substantial government support for our activities. More generally, we view this as an important milestone, as it marks the first time that the Government of Israel has acknowledged the acute nature of the issue of food security for children and has earmarked significant resources towards the issue.

There is a still a long road ahead, and we will continue to raise the necessary funds to expand our reach to additional children, while in parallel working towards the goal of encouraging the GOI to support and establish a national nutrition program in the country, similar to those which exist in many other Western nations.

I would like to take this opportunity to invite you to visit our new website, which tells the story of the organization from inception until today, and where you will find information about Nevet's team, our partners, and more. If possible, I would greatly appreciate receiving any feedback you might have about the website and ways to improve it.

Looking forward, we know that the upcoming year will bring its unique set of challenges, as we continuously strive to expand to new municipalities and grow. We also know that none of what we do would be possible without your help. Thus, on behalf of myself and the entire Nevet team,

### **Nevet by Numbers**

Twice in each year, Nevet invests in measuring and evaluating the impact of the program on participants – once in the middle of the academic year and once at its close. A questionnaire is sent to the heads of all participating institutions and organizations, from school principals to directors of Youth Advancement units in the municipalities, asking if they were satisfied with the sandwich program and asking them to consider what impact they believe it has had on the children.

## Shikmim-Maoz School, Sderot Principal: Ayala Hadad

"There are 408 students in the Shikmim-Maoz School for the Arts. This varied student body, the majority of whom come from low-income homes, enjoys exposure to a broad variety of plastic and performance arts, in an atmosphere infused with the values of striving for social and academic excellence. Our students learn how to play music, sing, perform, paint, and create as a means of expressing themselves and their world.


We have been participating in the Nevet program for many years now, and the sense of comfort and wellbeing that it generates among our students, knowing that in school their basic needs are being met, is profound. In our school no child goes hungry – not for food (thanks to Nevet) and not for love and a sense of belonging"



# Department for Youth Advancement, Kiryat Shemona Director: Tal Karavani

"My name is Tal Korani. Born and raised in Kiryat Shemona, I have been director "of the Youth Advancement program in the city for two years and am a big believer in its educational approach. My goal is to provide the best possible solution for teens who struggle to thrive in the normative frameworks of formal education. The unit provides these kids, who are considered at-risk, with programs that address both their educational and therapeutic needs, including preparedness for serving in the IDF, re-building relationships with their parents, employment, community, and more. This is the second year that we have been working with Nevet. The program has contributed to our work on several levels, but first and foremost among these is the atmosphere and experience of homeliness that it has evoked in the unit, particularly the sense of togetherness, comfort, and wellbeing generated by the experience of simply preparing food together"





"Ort Abu Talul is located in the village of Abu Talul in the regional council of Neve Midbar. The school was established in 2012 at the initiative of the Israeli Ministry of Education, and caters to students from the unrecognized villages in the area. Ort Abu Talul focuses on developing creativity and encouraging the curiosity of our students in order to prepare them for the modern, technologically savvy, world. We also infuse our educational efforts with democratic values in order to help our graduates acclimatize successfully into Israeli society.

Our students all come from low socio-economic backgrounds, and the administration and teaching faculty strive to provide them with a supportive educational, social, and emotional environment within the school, and encourage them to succeed. Our goal is to keep as many students in school as possible, and Nevet is a key part of that strategy.

There is no doubt that thanks to Nevet's "sandwich for every child" program the number of dropouts has decreased significantly in recent years and the level of academic achievement has gone up, as indicated by an increase in the number of graduates who sit for the matriculation exams. In addition to decreased levels of violence in the school, the program has also generated a sense of mutual respect among the students, who work together as a group to prepare the sandwiches. As a result, the program encourages cooperation, teamwork, and an awareness of the value of helping others. It gives students a sense of belonging and of accomplishment.

Based on this experience, it is my opinion that a national nutrition program for needy populations is a crucial step in narrowing gaps and generating social and educational equality. I believe that the responsibility for this program should be shared between government ministries, schools, and the community.

We in the Bedouin community as a whole and in Ort Abu Talul in particular, believe in equality and tolerance and would like to see these values embedded in our school. The Nevet program is considered one of the most important in the school and is one of the programs consistently lauded in my conversations with students, parents, and faculty, all of whom never fail to single out Nevet and its positive contribution"

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### Department for Youth Advancement, Kfar Kara Director: Maram Alyan-Masarwa



"The unit was established in 2011 in order to provide a solution for at-risk youth between the ages of 14-18 who had dropped out of school. We serve as a safe space and open house for these youth and work to return them to school by strengthening their sense of social responsibility, initiative, and personal motivation.

This is our second year of collaboration with Nevet. The teens who attend the program come from highly complex backgrounds, on the lower end of the socio-economic spectrum, often from broken homes with divorced parents and marked by neglect. It is therefore crucial that we be able to provide them with something as basic as good nutrition. Each day at a set time the kids receive a healthy sandwich prepared for them with lots of love by Renin, a therapeutic education staffer.

They all gather around the table to eat, and the atmosphere is always pleasant – they talk, they laugh, and they feel at home. Many come especially to experience what has come to be known as the "ceremony of the Youth Advancement Family meal." Some come straight from work and seek to comfort themselves with food, and some because there is no one at home to prepare food for them, and no food to be prepared.

In my opinion, it's very important, if not critical, to have a steady and nutritious food program throughout the year that gives these kids what they need, and encourages them to continue to show up, persevere, and take part in all the programs meant for them"

# Einat Socher, Business, Community and Partnerships Manager, Matan Invest in the Community

The international John Deere Ltd. invests significant resources in supporting food rescue, food security, and education across the globe. In Israel, this is done through the Matan Invest in the Community, which supports community projects in the fields of food and education. In addition to supporting food baskets for low-income families in Afula, we are now, in collaboration with Nevet, expanding our activities in the northern region of Israel by supporting the provision of sandwiches to school children in Beit Shean, Tiberias, and Afula, and including our employees in their preparation. For the past two years, the staff of John Deere in Israel have carried out two major volunteering events with the staff of Nevet at our factory in the Beit Shean valley, during which the employees prepared over 400 sandwiches in the morning and gave them out to the schools in the area. We are happy and excited by our collaboration with Nevet in particular, and by the wide-ranging social investments being made by John Deere in Israel more generally.

"Atid was founded in 2004, with the goal of establishing itself as a socially forward educational network committed to supporting the values of excellence, shared life, and mutual respect. We focus on building the generations of the future by positing innovation and change as a way of life. Atid currently consists of over 24,000 students in 60 junior and high schools across the country. In addition, we also work with the Ministry of Absorption and the Ministry for National Security on country-wide educational programs.

Atid provides school principals with logistical and financial support, human resources, legal counseling, information systems, and accounting services. The network has its own educational administration, resource and development authority, and teacher training programs.

Atid believes that its responsibility to our students includes creating an existential safety net for them during the hours that they are in school in order to prevent them from seeking solutions that are easier and quicker than school. We see Nevet's "sandwich for every child" program as an integral part of that strategy and have been collaborating with the organization for over seven years.

Although Nevet's nutrition program makes a substantial contribution to the daily lives of the recipients, it is clear that a more significant direction would be for government legislation and action on the part of the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Finance to allocate resources for a national nutrition program for students, similar to that which exists in numerous countries around the world. Of course, the meals could be subsidized or modular according to the needs of each student, but the comprehensive and uniform nature of the program would prevent students from feeling a sense of disparity or alienation from the group. A national program of this type could operate similarly to the one that provides scholarships for needy students in schools"

The past year has been a positive one of growth and development. We have taken a significant leap forward in a number of areas, including:

The launch of a new website – the newly revised and restructured website tells the organizational story of Nevet and provides a wide variety of relevant and related content. The website is part of the organization's ongoing project of adapting itself to the constantly evolving digital world and is part of a broader upgrade of our entire digital system.





Entering new municipalities and regional authorities – this year saw several municipalities and regional authorities join the "sandwich for every child" program, including Be'er Sheva, Kfar Saba, Netivot, Mitzpe Ramon, and Tzfat.

Onboarding these new areas requires a significant investment of Nevet's resources – both of time and money – to building and setting up the necessary infrastructure in regions that rank lowest (1-3) on the Ministry of Welfare's socio-economic scale, where the need is greatest, and the available resources limited. We hope to see this trend continue next year as well.



The Ministry of Welfare has recently launched a new criteria test, several years in development, to determine which organizations they are willing to support. As a result of passing this test, Nevet has been able to significantly expand our activities among the weakest sectors on the socio-geographic periphery of Israel.
